We've had lots of career events happening this term for different year groups. This is as part of our commitment to give students a wide range of experiences so they are able to see the many options that are available to them locally and nationally, this includes one to one career meetings with both Y9 and Y10 students. We've also had employers such as Peregrine House, Sainsbury's, Hiscock's and Whitby Seafoods in to speak to students about the types of job they offer: Sainsbury's and Peregrine House also had some job opportunities for our Sixth Form students. We've also had visits including, York, Hull, CU Scarborough and Leeds Beckett for a range of students, including Sixth Form students and a visit for some Y10 students to Whitby Fishing School.

Y8 students had fun with CU Scarborough finding out more about their courses and the types of jobs they could lead to. They could describe the course in three words, draw a picture or act it out. There was also a task to work out the job by using picture clues.



Twelve of our Y8 students went to the University of Hull as part of the High Five programme. They learned about research and presentation techniques before going on

to do their own presentation with the title 'University is rubbish, prove me wrong!' As well as having a tour of Hull campus - the views from the top of the library were amazing!



Seven Y10 students took part in Project Dare, which is funded by FutureHY.

They visited Whitby Sixth Form site to take part in an online call with Hiscox Insurance and York Cares to kick off the project. Their first task was to build the tallest structure they could out of spaghetti and marshmallows.

Their project is to create an on brand pet insurance for Hiscox.

It was a great morning, and when asked the





highlights were the free lunch and enjoying the calm atmosphere at Sixth Form. The second part of Project Dare was to visit the Hiscox offices in York where they presented their finished presentation to Hiscox employees and were also treated to a £10 Amazon voucher, the winning team were also given chocolates.

Students from Caedmon College and Eskdale school visited Whitby Fishing School to find out more about working in maritime jobs. They had talks from Whitby Fishing School; Whitby Lobster Hatchery; Whitby Seafoods; Parkol Marine; a retired fisherman who teaches at the fishing school and also about Marine Biology.

They got a tour around the docks, lobster hatchery and marina.

NYBEP a local careers partner of ours came into Whitby Sixth Form and worked with some of our Y9 and Y12 students got the chance to find out more about jobs in STEM. Their challenge was to create a hat out of straws that could hold a ping pong ball and a golf ball! They also got to talk to visiting employers about various STEM opportunities.

# MET OFFICE WEATHER STATION

**W**hitby weather station has been in its current location in the school grounds for 50 years this year, with the same voluntary observer former Whitby Community College teacher, Peter Wallace. On Wednesday 29 June, there was a presentation for Mr Wallace by Peter Harvey, former student who now works at the Met Office). Peter will have been collecting data at 9.00am GMT every day for 50 years in November of this year. Each day he takes readings from the thermometer for air temp, measures the daily rainfall, checks the ground temperature at two different levels and records the amount of sunlight from the previous day. There is also a check on the temperature at grass level to record ground frost.

This data is reported to the Met Office who use it to both forecast and to check the accuracy of forecasts made by feeding the info into their supercomputer that does the analysis using algorithms.

Data from the weather station located on



Caedmon College grounds can be accessed from the Met Office's Weather Observation Website (<https://wow.metoffice.gov.uk/>).



**Mr Wallace has told us that his instruments measured 37.9°C on 19 July, a new record. The previous record stands as 34°C from 1906!!**

# SCHOOL MEALS

Please note that it will be necessary to increase the price of a school meal to £2.60 from September, due to the high cost increases in supplies, energy and increases in basic staffing costs. We have kept the increase to a minimum and the College will be subsidising the cost of the service at this price) - we have considered the prices being charged at other schools in North Yorkshire and these are, on average, higher than the proposed price to be charged, ranging up to £2.80 in a number of schools. We will be continuing to focus on providing quality food for students and have asked our Catering Team (NYCC County Caterers) to undertake some student focus groups and surveys to help with this in the Autumn term. The allowance for a free school meal will be set at £2.50 from September, as this reflects the government's reimbursement amount of £2.47 per meal taken. Please note that any amounts spent above the free school meal allowance on any day will need to be covered by parents and please ensure that school dinner accounts are always in credit before your son or daughter takes food from the canteen. This can be done in school via the 'Reval' box along the main corridor on

the Normanby Site (for Years 7 to 11) or by paying by credit/debit card online through the ParentPay cashless catering software system, for which you will have received details from us. If you need any help to gain access to ParentPay, please do not hesitate to contact the College Office.

## REMINDER - DROPPING OFF/COLLECTING YOUR SON/DAUGHTER

Please note that, for health and safety reasons, we cannot allow parents to drive down the College driveway in the mornings. It is requested, for student safety, that parents avoid coming onto the College site with vehicles, as far as possible. For this reason, the gate at the top of the Normanby Site's driveway will be manned between 8.50am and 9.00am each morning then closed going forwards.

We must make this request due to the volume of College traffic and the limited walkway area around the driveway. The car park at the top of the school drive is quite small and parents using it at the end of the day often find themselves struggling to park. The road down to the College has single yellow lines on one side, however, Mayfield Road has space for parking which is easy to access.

There are many students leaving the site at 3.30pm and we need it to be as safe as possible for them. Please avoid turning into the top car park if there is space on Mayfield Road. We would also ask you to be respectful of our neighbours and not block their access or park in the emergency parking bay.

Please can all parents also note that using Beaver's Car Park is not permitted for collecting or dropping off College students. Thank you for your support and understanding in this matter.
