

Financial Help

A Sixth Form bursary is available for WSF students to apply for if you have a household income of less than £28,000.

St Hilda's Bursary: This is available for all students to apply for. You can use the St Hilda's bursary for anything that enriches your life experiences.

The Paul Hogarth Bursary: Last year Paul Hogarth passed away. He was an integral part of ICL Boulby Mine for 27 years, as well as his role as a Central Overseer at ICL Boulby, Paul and his family ran their family farm near Whitby and all his children studied at Caedmon College Whitby/Whitby Sixth Form. Paul was an early enthusiast for Polysulphate, a product which ICL Boulby now mines.

The Hogarth family along with ICL Boulby (Cleveland Potash) launched the Paul Hogarth Bursary.

The bursary awarded is £5000 for each year of study at university, this could be for a 3 or 4 year course.

The bursary is not means tested, therefore anyone intending to study at University and is a student at WSF can apply.

This year the bursary was awarded to Grace Fuller.







I would like to thank our parents and community who supported one of our schools in its recent Ofsted Inspection. Following the previous inspection, as I have explained earlier, a follow up inspection was expected by a Majesty's Inspector of Schools (HMI) and an Ofsted Inspection team. Children and colleagues were simply wonderful, and throughout the two days the Senior HMI and colleagues undertook a forensic review of the school focusing on the same areas we had identified in October. We will be sharing the report itself and those recommendations once the report has been produced, quality assured and officially published by Ofsted.


I would also like to thank our parents who participated in the recent questionnaire about the creation of our new school. We intend over the next few weeks and months to shape a unique and exciting vision for our new school, as part of the ongoing consultation. It is clear our parents and our wider community see this as a priority, and we would agree.

I am also pleased to announce that the Chair of the Whitby Partnership Board, supported by colleagues, has established a working group to define the name, mission, and values of our new school. The working group intends to consult with colleagues, parents, our children, and wider community. As part of this process, we will publish its final recommendations, subject to approval by the governing body, by the end of the year.





Our survey issued before half-term, indicates most parents believe the names of both schools do recognise the heritage and history of our community. We will also carefully consider the mission and values, as they will come to define our community and shape its sense of purpose.



Celebrating the heritage and history of our schools and town was acknowledged as being important, but again some felt this was not as prevalent as it should be, and other parents felt unable to comment based on their current experience.

Your thoughts and feedback will be carefully considered and the detailed responses from parents will be referenced in our ongoing discussions.

We look forward to sharing more responses to the survey in a future issue and once again, I would like to thank parents for participating and would ask all to contribute to the wider consultation, as we shape the future of education in Whitby, for our children and generations to come.

I like a book that makes me laugh and cry.



German Exchange Visit to Whitby by students and staff from Heinrich Böll Schule

Mr Bloor, who masterminded the whole visit reports on a fantastic experience for our young people, as the photos show:

After a break of almost 5 years due to the pandemic, we are delighted to welcome a group of 27 students and two teachers back to Whitby at the beginning of October. Eskdale School has had a successful exchange programme with the Heinrich-Böll Schule in Fürth (south-west Germany) since 2002. The school is in a beautiful forest area of Germany (the Odenwald) about 50 miles south of Frankfurt. This visit was designed to restart the exchange programme with just 4 German students staying with host families and 23 students staying at East Barnby Outdoor Centre. The idea was to enable German students to get to know English students of their own age through a range of activities and build on these connections in the future.



The German students flew from Frankfurt to Manchester and arrived by coach at East Barnby at lunch time on Saturday 7 th October. After settling in, they walked from Kettleness to Runswick Bay to spend some time on the beach (Fürth is over 300 miles from the sea!). The Sunday was spent with students from Eskdale and Caedmon College who showed the German students around the town.



On Monday the group explored the local area (North York Moors Railway/Goathland and the Moors) as well as going on a short boat trip out to sea. Tuesday morning gave the students an opportunity to experience lessons at Eskdale and Caedmon College and then in the afternoon students from both Whitby schools met with the German young people and the French exchange group from Caedmon for an afternoon of activities (art, drama, problem-solving and sport). This was a fantastic afternoon with young people from 3 countries communicating, interacting and having fun with each other.

On Wednesday the German group were accompanied by English students on a day trip to York and in the evening some of the same Eskdale and Caedmon students joined the Germans for a farewell party and campfire at East Barnby. After a final morning in Whitby (in brilliant sunshine) the German party left for Manchester airport.

The German students and staff all had an amazing time in Whitby. The Eskdale and Caedmon College students involved in the exchange went above and beyond to make our guests feel welcome and I am very grateful both to them and the host families. Danke!

We are looking to have a return journey to Germany just after Easter with the opportunity for our students to stay either with a host family or at a local youth hostel. Watch this space!


