Georgie has been an absolute star in Years 7, 8 and 9, and we will miss her. We wish her the very best!




Grade 5 Exam Success

Why study Drama and Theatre Studies at WSF



If you enjoy working practically and solving problems then drama and theatre may be for you. If you take drama and theatre at A-level you will create unique performances, you will put yourself in a director's shoes and work on a variety of plays and performance projects. You will go to the theatre and build your skills as both a critic and play-maker. You will discover just 'how magical' the theatre is and how new practitioners are shaping the stage today following in the footsteps of the great names of our stage and theatre world, such as Brecht, Stanislavski, Artaud.

What do students do afterwards?

Past students have gone on to tread the boards, to present on live radio and appear in film, adverts and video. Others have chosen to study Theatre at places such as The Central School of Speech and Drama in London and LIPA taking performing arts, such as dance, or perhaps you just want to study an A-level that will give you confidence and resilience, making you stand out in a crowd in a highly-competitive world. Whatever your reasons, drama is also accepted by universities, providing UCAS points for your next step in education.



How will I be assessed?

20% theatre workshop; 40% performance, supported by written process and evaluation;

40% written exam.

What can I do to prepare?

If you haven't done GCSE drama, no worries. In the first term, you will quickly develop your skills and be ready for your drama and theatre journey. Talk to other drama students, come along to Drama Club, get involved in your local amateur dramatics company, go to the theatre, watch film, write, and come and have a chat with the friendly drama staff. As Shakespeare said, 'All the world's a stage and we are but players...'.

"Doing A-level drama at Whitby Sixth Form allows you to work closely with your teacher. Drama is a practical based subject, however, it does include written work in the forms of exams and coursework, yet although written work is something I struggle with, I feel like this aspect to A-level drama doesn't make me love it any less."









Creating Connections - Well-being project

Mr Bloor, who has led and coordinated the project gives a summary of what has happened this term and all the opportunities that over a hundred of our students have had.

Background and rationale

As a school we have been very lucky to receive substantial funding from the Ideas Foundation to run a creativity and well-being programme with KS3 (Years 7 - 9). The Ideas Foundation works with companies and organisations in the creative economy to enable schools to access funding and support in order to introduce young people to this important sector.

In the past they have helped us organise sustainable fashion days with Burberry, poetry and identity workshops with Pantene and a photography project with Canon. This new "Creating Connections" project has been running at Eskdale since the beginning of the autumn term. Its aim is to improve student well-being in KS3 through creativity, exploring their own lives in Whitby and creating connections to the wider world.

Specifically, for students:

- » Creative mindsets how to nurture creativity
- » Strategies to deal with creative blocks
- » Looking after mental health
- >> How to detox and manage your own pressures
- » Discovering your strengths and what sparks you

The project has received £3000 funding from the Ideas Foundation to enable this project. £1000 of this is for a core group of eleven Year 9 students to choose and plan activities that will boost their own











well-being through creativity. This group will also pass on what they have learned to other students in their cohort. £2000 for the school to run activities aimed at all KS3 students

What have we done so far?

- Sun, Space, Art project: Cambridge Physics (solar specialist) professor Helen Mason worked with 35 Year 8/Year 9 students and all of Year 7 on a creative project combining science and art.
- A drama workshop with professional actor Ben Worth for over 30 students in Year 9
- » A poetry workshop with Adisa the Verbalizer (performance poet) with over 30 Year 9 students.
- A creativity and well-being workshop for the core group with Adisa and Ben Worth
- Two-day Photography workshop with professional photographer and cameras supplied by Canon for 20 students. Focus of the workshop was "Growing up in Whitby". The students kept the cameras to work on their projects before a final workshop on 21st December. We hope to be able to display the results of their creativity in an exhibition in the New Year.
- The core group and 4 other Year 9 students spent a day in London on 7th December. This is what they had planned and decided to spend their budget on. The day focused on creativity and included:













- (i) A visit to the Barbican Centre where we had a tour of the centre from ex-Eskdale student Bradley Thompson who now works there. Bradley was able to tell the students about his work in the creative sector.
- (ii) A walking tour of some of the main London sights. For most of the students this was their first time in London.
- (iii) A West-End show Les Misérables.



The response of our students to all of these activities has been overwhelmingly positive. They have engaged incredibly well with the facilitators who have come into school and have developed some amazing creative ideas. They also all report the positive effect this programme has had on their mental health and well-being. The opportunities to spend time away from the classroom to develop creativity, build relationships and confidence, gain an increased sense of belonging to their school community, explore the wider world and have fun have seen a real boost of positivity.











More Year 11 careers opportunities...

Following on from last month's employability workshops from Inspiring Choice, our Year 11 students had the chance to practice their new skills by taking part in mock interviews with real employers. The fifteen-minute interviews saw them asked general questions they would likely be asked in a real interview. There were some worried faces going into the interviews, but thankfully plenty of smiles after! Feedback from the students was that it was really helpful and great to get a chance to practice their interview technique before they needed to use it for a job, apprenticeship or university interview.

It was great to have the support of many local businesses in the area, as well as our career partners. Thank you to Whitby Town Council, Anglo American, Whitby Distillery, Nature's Laboratory, The Army, Air Cadets, Hull University, CU Scarborough, York St John University, Whitby Seafoods, Scarborough Skills Village, Psst Marketing and Inspiring Choices for your help, support and fantastic feedback. Our students now feel much more confident in their abilities in the world of work. And thank you too to Miss Mackle, our careers lead who coordinated the whole event, which took some doing!

WCC Welcomes back former students and staff

Beth Hansell reports on the Centenary Launch where students and staff past and present shared stories about school life.

On Friday 16 March 2012, 100 ex-students and staff from Whitby Community College attended the opening event for the College's Centenary Year. This marked the beginning of a series of events and activities which will culminate in an exhibition at the Pannett Museum later this year. This will highlight key events in the life of the College since it first opened its doors on 25 September 1912. Then, it was known as 'The County School Whitby' and it has changed its name several times over the years to reflect the many changes and developments in the education system. The school has grown over the year from just 66 students in 1912 to around 1000 students now.

The afternoon was incredibly successful and was enjoyed by all. Approximately 30 students took part in the afternoon and enjoyed 'meeting and greeting' the visitors, comprising past pupils and teaching staff. Throughout the afternoon, a film of the school from the past was played and the guests were able to give the students information about the film, including



names of people to contact in order to find out more information. As well as the film, there were numerous display boards around the Learning Centre with past exam results, photos and school records which dated back to the earliest days of the











school on show for guests to view and discuss amongst themselves.

The students chatted with visitors and filled out questionnaires so that they could learn more about the College's past and increase the amount of information available ready for the exhibition at Pannett Museum later this year.

We particularly enjoyed hearing stories from the ex-students enabling us to compare our school life to theirs. One student, Oliver Chilton said, "I really enjoyed the afternoon and I would love to repeat the experience". Watching past pupils recognise each other from their school days and greeting each other with enthusiasm was a highlight of the afternoon for many.

The former pupils and staff were keen to have a look around the College site too and names were taken for tours of the College which will take place during the summer term.

All in all, it was a memorable and very productive afternoon and visitors thanked the College for inviting them. One guest commented "a lovely afternoon, in which the pupils were patient and courteous and a credit


